# OW News - Obituaries

## Roy Hawkes, 46-57 G

Died 1st December 2024



### Obituary written by his close friend, Paul Blunt (51-59, PS)

Roy Hawkes was born in Bedford and after Prep School entered Garnes House in 1954 a year late due to a bout of polio at his Prep School from which he had recovered well. His second cousin David was already established in Garnes. We became friends straight away as we were both taking part in a production of 'A Midsummer Nights Dream'. Roy was involved in productions each year either as a performer or a stage hand usually on the lighting board. He was a keen member of the CCF Band first as a drummer and, in his last 2 years as a most proficient Band Sergeant Major where his imposition of strict discipline raised the standard of drill and playing to a very high standard. In 1958 he was appointed Captain of Garnes and in January 1959 became Head Prefect. On leaving School he joined BTH in Rugby, staying with them through various changes of name and in the early 1970s moved to English Electric in Stafford. He had already taken a degree externally with London University. In the mid 1970s he joined a firm in Warwickshire as a consultant and remained there for the rest of his working life having settled in Stratford-upon-Avon. During the 70s/80s he was a member of the OW Committee. In retirement he devoted much time to the local Rotary Club especially helping in the organisation of the Annual Marathon Race and in Public Speaking Competitions for local Schools. He also organised the local Young Enterprise Scheme encouraging local schools to enable students in the Sixth Form to learn how to run a business for a year by creating a product and then selling to the public through trade fairs. Roy got me interested in this and after helping him with a half day meeting of several local schools it inspired me to become a n Adviser on YE with Wellingborough School for 17 years. We met up regularly for theatre trips both in Stratford at the RSC and in Northampton, Milton Keynes and Oxford as well as celebration meals. After a few years of poor health, Roy suffered a massive stroke at the end of November 2024 and died 2 days later leaving his wife Margaret, daughter Lucille and 3 grandsons to whom we offer deepest sympathy in their loss. After 70 years friendship it has created a gap in my life as rarely a week passed when we spoke on the phone as well as frequent meetings.

## Edward Robert Poole, 65-70 G

Died 10th September 2024

It is with great sadness that Hilary and family inform the OW Club of the sudden death of Rob on 10th September 2024, he was aged 72.

Rob joined Wellingborough School from Spratton Hall as a day boy and then moved to board in Garne's House. Rob particularly enjoyed athletics and we understand that he still holds the shotput record for the Shell Year, he launched a shot so far that it rolled down the branch of a tree and through the rear window of a parked car. His love and enjoyment of music was enhanced by being a member of the choir.

In September 1970 the school admitted girls but only into the 6th form, in that year there were only two girls at the school of which Hilary was one. Hilary and Rob met at an OW day, we were married in 1977 and are the first OW couple to be married. We have three daughters and four grandchildren, Rob was first and foremost a family man.

So deeply missed.





## OW News - Obituaries

**Tim Burkitt, 45-50, PS**

**Died 25th November 2024**



Timothy J.K. Burkitt was born on the 1st of November 1933 in Wellingborough. He attended Wellingborough School from the years 1945 to 1950, after achieving a Foundation Scholarship to attend the school. During his time at the school, he was a keen and avid runner, winning the Junior school steeplechase and 440 yards. As he progressed through the school entering Senior School Timothy won the Geoffrey Lynn Memorial Prize as well as the prize for best School Certificate. Throughout his exams in 1950 Timothy took up cycling and became a fast cyclist competing in races and won many short track races as well as hill climbs. Which was nominally an "Olympic Possible".

Timothy worked in Engineers Design offices in Peterborough and Northampton from 1954 to 1956 and passed the Institution of Civil Engineers Parts 1 and 2. Timothy obtained a place at Imperial College London, but however was unable to take up the option as he was called up for National Service in September and joined the Royal Air Force from 1956 to 1959.

Before Timothy passed away, he wrote down some of his memories of Wellingborough School.

"It was a privilege to be educated at Wellingborough and the experience has helped me in work, study, sport and play.

As a scholarship boy I was expected to produce reasonable academic results, but I remember admiring those easy performers who were always adequate at school without swotting (it was considered very infra dig to swot) and those who achieved effortless results on the sports field.

We were generally instructed by committed and competent masters, but woe betide any teacher who despite his commitment, lost the "fire initiative" over his pupils. School boys can be very cruel, and I recall the surrealistic night of one master's bicycle floating in midair over the rolling early Autumn mists. It had been hauled up the pavilion flagpole and was an object of veneration until brought down and some say dismantled and cast into the swimming pool."

# Schools News

## Retired teacher's running success

Hi, this is Chris Martin-Sims - I was a teacher at the school between 1988 and 2018 and I thought I'd update you on one of the activities I am currently involved with as it may be of a little interest to some of those whom I taught.

One of the first things to happen to me after I left the school was to have both my knees replaced with total knee replacement surgery. I thought that this would be a life changing event, and it was, but in an unexpected direction. Whilst I recovered, my wife, Lisiane, who worked in the catering department at the school for 20 years, began to undertake Park Runs on a Saturday and progressed to completing her first half marathon in Bedford in 2018. I would accompany her to Wicksteed Park and at first just watched as she and the other runners completed their 5 km. But then I started to walk around the course slowly. After a number of months I progressed to power walking the course and eventually began to jog round slowly. This was the situation until Covid struck and throughout the lockdown months I increased the number of kilometers I would walk or run. With the cessation of lockdown regulations in February 2022 I challenged myself to undertake the Cambridge Boundary Run half marathon. This is a little-known half marathon, organised by the undergraduate students at Cambridge University and takes place in March of each year. I finished last, in 2 hours 55 minutes, but was probably the oldest by about 45 years as most of the participants are undergraduates. Since then I have continued to take part in 10 km and half marathons as well as the Saturday Park Runs. Last year I completed 11 10 km races and 8 half marathons and whilst my times don't get that much quicker I now aim to complete the half marathons in around 2 hours 20 minutes and 10 km in just under the hour. My wife joins me in as many of the races as she can, though being in full time work this is sometimes difficult. Together with my wife I often bump into two other Wellingburians - George Houghton (current Housemaster and teacher) and Joe Ramsden (pupil and ex-teacher). They are in a completely different league to me, over an hour faster than my best efforts, but it is always a pleasure to see them at the start (but not the end!).

This year marks my seventieth year and I am 'celebrating' by taking part in another Cambridge Half Marathon. Not the Boundary Run, but the official TTP half marathon. The half marathon takes place the day after my birthday and on the birthday itself I hope to complete my two hundredth Park Run at Coldham Common. My wife will be joining me and together we will be raising money for a local choir she sings in called 'Dementia Sings Out' which meets every Thursday in Wellingborough to give those with dementia a chance to socialise and sing. The choir has close Wellingborough School connections as both Ruth and Gary Bowe are heavily involved in the organisation and running of the charity.

I hope that this may be of interest to some of the old alumni and an encouragement to those who think that their days of running are over. I thoroughly recommend the camaraderie of the Park Runs. I recently bumped into two Old Wellingburians - Claire Saxby and Isabelle Carter-Mckay (not sure that is right spelling, she left in 2018) at Wicksteed Park.



## Astronomy Club

In 2024, the OW Committee were approached by a current student who was keen to start an Astronomy Club at the School but needed support with financing a telescope. Hearing his passion for starting the club and understanding the benefit the telescope would bring, the OW Committee were happy to make a donation.

Headmaster Andrew Holman commented, 'Not least through the considerable support provided by OWs, our Astronomy Club goes from strength to strength. The images shared have all been gathered by members of the Club - everyone will recognise the Moon, and probably Saturn, but we also have an image of Jupiter and some of its moons. The equipment the Club now has has enabled it to extend its reach - not only within the Solar System, but also the student body, where wonderment and awe accompany meetings, some of which take place on School balconies or wherever a good angle can be found.'

It was great to see so many OWs at the School's Careers Fair last term. Around 50 universities, colleges and businesses exhibited - with many of those being OWs.

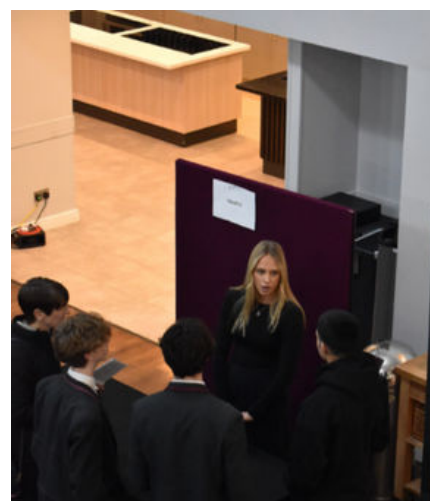

Readers may recall that I used the above quotation in the 2022 Wellingburian (shortly after we launched Project COPENICUS) to introduce an article on the School's 30-year master plan for the development of the school site. In many ways however, the quotation is equally applicable to the financial challenges facing Wellingborough School.

You will be very aware that independent schools have been hit hard by the current Government's triple whammy of VAT on fees, loss of charitable business rate reliefs, and increased employer's National Insurance costs. The first two of these measures were expected; for some time, we have been preparing and implementing measures to mitigate the financial impacts as far as possible. However, phrases from London such as 'schools cutting their cloth' or 'reducing non-essential expenditure' to 'absorb' VAT and other taxes are unhelpful when the School long ago stripped out such in order to ensure we are offering the very best value for money for our parents.

You will not have noticed many of the changes and adaptations the School has put in place over the last couple of years – appropriately so, because they are intended to be sub-surface - which range from corporate and governance restructuring, refining commercial activities, consolidating land ownership, and a host of technical financial mitigations. The net effect is that, at least in the short-term, we have been able to absorb most of the costs of VAT for parents.

Whilst VAT was not a surprise, the subsequent announcement in the Autumn budget statement on the new employer national insurance rates, coupled with a lowering of the thresholds, was unexpected and unwelcome in equal measure. It negates some of our mitigations and adds another £0.25 million to our cost base from April 2025. In these hostile financial conditions, the role of the School is to continue to deliver a first-class all-round education to the pupils, in the most financially efficient manner. Wellingborough is confident – not complacent – that we have an educational offer and business model that will allow the School to prosper over the next 450 years. It is sadly inevitable however, that some areas – for example, funds the School can make available for bursaries – will inevitably come under pressure in the years ahead...

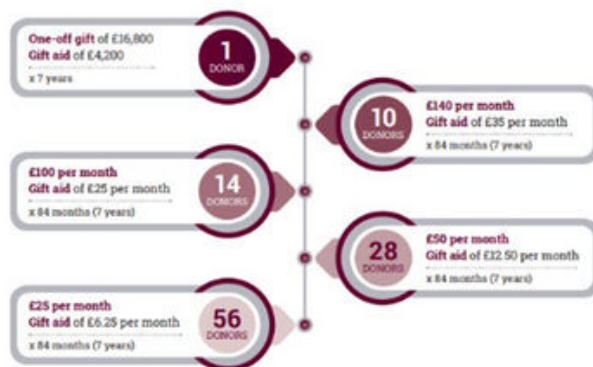
### Transformational Bursaries

### Project Copernicus (campus development)

In late 2021, after an extensive review, the Governors decided that the School would remain on its current 55-acre site on London Road. A master planning exercise looked at the physical manifestation to support future ways of teaching and learning as well as better optimising the 'town/field' balance, improving vehicular access, allowing the School to better play its part as a member of the community and achieving a net zero carbon sustainable footprint.

Project Copernicus preserves and enhances the best of Wellingborough School while adopting a strategic approach to developing the facilities. The Technology Centre represents the first building under the masterplan and is on track to open in September 2025. The new Technology Centre and Gatehouse will house the new reception, medical and welfare facilities as well as a lecture theatre and multi-purpose teaching spaces. As the existing Design and Technology Department is currently off site, this was also seen as a priority to bring on to site to sit alongside the IT department so that Technology teaching as a whole can be updated and refreshed.

The sports facilities were also identified as being in need of replacement and consolidation, along with the desire to provide a swimming pool. The new Sports Centre will be located opposite the Gatehouse so a new secure line can be established between the two buildings.

All visitor and most staff parking will be located in the carparks that sit in front of these two buildings so drop-off and general vehicular access will be improved.

The Gatehouse, Sports Centre and new carpark can then be secured separately from the main body of the School, allowing us to maximise sharing these facilities with the wider community.
